News from the Silver Bug:

Canadian Silver Dollar History (part 1)

This month we will feature two of Canada's more elusive and highly sought-after silver dollars: (1) the 1911 S.D. and (2) the 1948 S.D.

Let's begin our numismatic journey with the most valuable and elusive silver dollar: the 1911, the 1911 is the "Holy Grail" of all Canadian coins.

For many years it held the record as the world's most valuable coin. Only 3 examples were ever struck, one in bronze and two in silver.

The bronze example and one silver example are housed at the Canadian Currency Museum in Ottawa, which leaves only one out there in some one's collection. At an auction in 2003 the coin was sold for close to one million dollars. At one time as the story goes, it was owned by a Doctor from Timmins. Latest buzz, it is now in the possession of an American dealer.

Next on our list is the 1948, the 1948 is dubbed "the king of Canadian silver dollars".

It's listed mintage was a mere 18,780, but as you all know, finding one today for your collection in a higher grade is a difficult task.

The story behind the low mintage of the 48 has to do with India's independence in 1947. Prior to 1948, the obverse of Canadian coinage featured the effigy of the reigning monarch with their name and royal title in a Latin inscription. Part of their royal title included the designation of "Emperor of India". So this designation had to be removed from the 1948 coins. By the time the mint received the new dies, they were only able to produce a small quantity as the listed mintage indicates.

A 1948 S.D. will on occasion go on the auction block at a coin show or coin club, and usually sells for between \$1000 - \$20,000 depending on the coins grade of course.

I have never seen one offered at any of our Club's "Trading Sessions" in many moons, have you?
